Minister's Minute:

Dear Brothers and Sisters, "Love one another"

As we anticipate the beginning of Lent on the 22nd of this month we begin thinking about how St. Francis spent his Lents in prayer, fasting and almsgiving reflecting on the MERCY of God in his life.

"Rule 7 and Article 13 of the Constitutions guide us in how we might spend ours: united as "brothers and sisters of penance" and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls 'conversion." Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily. On this road to renewal, the sacrament of reconciliation is the privileged sign of the Father's MERCY and the source of grace.

Secular Franciscans called in earlier times the brothers and sisters of penance proposed to live in the spirit of continual conversion. Some means to cultivate this characteristic of the Franciscan vocation, individually and in fraternity are: listening to and celebrating the Word of God, review of life, spiritual retreats, the help of a spiritual advisor and penitential celebrations. They should approach the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Sacrament of MERCY by Thomas Weinandy OFM Cap- a guide to confession) frequently and participate in the communal celebrations of it, whether in fraternity or with the whole people of God.

The fruits of conversion which is a response to the love of God are the works of charity (MERCY) in the interactions with brothers and sisters."

As you will see in the rest of the Porter our fraternity has the opportunity to learn more about Divine Mercy and grow in our trust in God "witnessing to the poor crucified Christ even in difficulties and persecutions" (rule 10) at our Retreat this Saturday at St. John the Evangelist. Also in our outreach to the poor and hungry at the Light House and Phoenix Academy, and in our prayer for the dead Sr Patricia we do the spiritual and corporal works of MERCY. The topics for the Social Ministry Convocation workshops at MERCY High School are wonderful way to learn to live out our JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION values along with participating in the 40 Days for Life and the Maryland March for Life as we stand up for the greatest of God's Creations.

Ninety-two years ago, on Feb. 22, 1931, our Lord offered us the image if his mercy with the signature: Jesus, I Trust in You - a visual letter of God to us all. About the Speaker:

Sr. M. Donata Farbaniec was born in Poland. She joined the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in 1995. She is a perpetually professed sister and works as a member of a formation team accompanying the candidates on the first stages of their religious life. In 2016, she began a ministry propagating the message of Divine Mercy at the St. John Paul II National Shrine in Washington, D.C. where she continues her efforts.

1. ABCs of Social Justice

While its mission to love, advocate, serve and teach has never changed, the needs of those it serves and the challenges of meeting those needs have expanded dramatically. Today, as it celebrates 100 years as an agency, it has evolved in many ways to become one of America's largest Catholic Charities. 3. Who Lives Where: Systemic Racism and the Housing Shortage

Are we funding segregation? Beyond the Boundaries works for racial and economic diversity in housing with our partners in the Inclusionary Housing Coalition.

A Parish Green Team: A New Way of Being Community (AM Only)

Presenters: The Green Team of St. John Evangelist in Columbia, Chairperson Kathleen Valdivia

"Many things have to change course, but it is we human beings above all who need to change. We lack an awareness of our common origin, of our mutual belonging, and of a future to be shared with everyone." (Pope Francis, Laudato Si). Have you wondered how your parish and community can take up this challenge to care for our common home? Join us to look at ways we can work together for a more sustainable future for all.

5. The Catholic Church's Response to Racism: How to be Anti-Racist

Presenters: Adrienne Curry, M. Div., Director of the Office of Black Catholic Ministries and Darron Woodus, Pastoral Associate Holy Family (Randallstown)

Racism is not merely one sin among many; it is a radical evil that divides the human family and

denies the new creation of a redeemed world. To struggle against it demands an equally radical transformation in our own minds and hearts as well as in the structure of our society. This workshop will look at how the Catholic Church addresses racism through the lens of Catholic Social Teaching, pastoral letters, and other church documents, as well as ways to combat the sin of racism. We will also look at the process of canonization of saints in the Catholic Church.

6. The Relentless Pace of Murder in Baltimore Continues. What Can One Person Do to Help?

Presenters: Yvonne Wenger, Director of Community Affairs, Archdiocese of Baltimore; Jim Casey, Grief Ministry volunteer; Nora Collins, Director, Ignatian Volunteer Corps in Baltimore; & Homicide Survivor Advocates, Baltimore Police Department and Roberta's House

The Archdiocese of Baltimore's Grief Ministry works to support victims' families through a partnership with the Baltimore Police Department and Roberta's House, a family grief support center. The Grief Ministry will not solve the systemic issues that contribute to the murders, but it does provide an opportunity to live into our Christian call for peacemaking through family-to-family connections channeling compassion, awareness, and prayer to confront the suffering and desolation. This workshop explores the impact the ministry has on volunteers and families served.

7. Accountability is the New Evangelization

Presenter: James Conway, St. Wenceslaus Baltimore As a faith community we have a framework of evangelizing to people who have very little experience with adversity in the church, but how do we evangelize to those that have been hurt by or have adverse feelings to the church? Who is integral in facilitating this process?

8. Journeying Together with Young People: How to Build an Alive and Authentic Church

Presenters: Rudy Dehaney, Northeast Catholic Community; Nicholas Stein, Bon Secours Young Adults; Stefanie Miles, Archdiocese of Washington Over the past two years, the USCCB has been journeying together with young adults of different cultural backgrounds to look at how we build a better Church. This session will talk about the journey, its struggles and joys, lessons learned, and steps we should take to address issues across cultural families together with young people.

9. Our Church and Labor: Principles & Practice (PM Only)

Presenters: Clayton Sinyai, Executive Director, Catholic Labor Network; Maryland Catholic Labor Network Leadership Team

Catholic labor leaders, clergy, and advocates will discuss the US Catholic Church's rich doctrinal basis and history of support for organized labor. As a major non-profit employer, how well does our Church exemplify good employer practices? Where does it come up short, and can it do better for its employees without diminishing its services to the poor.

10. Maryland Catholic Conference 2023 Legislative Session Update

Presenter: Jenny Kraska, Executive Director, Maryland Catholic Conference

Our faith inspires us to respond to pressing current statewide challenges. We are called to listen, encounter, and work together to promote civility, justice, and a state that welcomes and accompanies those who are most vulnerable and in need. Join us as we discuss the most recent advocacy efforts in the 2023 Maryland Legislative Session and explains how each one of us can make our voices heard.

11. Equity Now: Redlining, Unconscious Bias and Baltimore's Equity Mission for Real Inclusion Presenter: Dana Moore, Chief Equity Officer, City of Baltimore

Baltimore City is the birthplace of redlining. With a global impact, sadly, it is one of our greatest exports, so to speak. The City continues to labor under its artifacts. But the City is also hyper focused on assuring that the remnants of redlining are addressed and that access to opportunity and services is equitable.

12. Come and Listen: Transgender Catholic Families and Individuals Share Their Experiences Living in a Catholic Parish

Transgender Catholics and Catholic family members share their experiences growing up in a Catholic parish. They will speak about their struggles as a family and within their parish, as well as about their search for community and acceptance.

40 DAYS FOR LIFE

The 40 Days for Life campaign to pray and fast for an end to abortion is on for this Feb. 22nd to April 2nd at the Annapolis Planned Parenthood.

With one of its three pregnancy clinics directly across the street from Planned Parenthood on West Street, Wellspring Life Ministry has emphasized the importance of these vigils to hopefully change the hearts and minds of moms considering abortion to reconsider life for their child instead. Our prayer and presence at Planned Parenthood can also change the hearts and minds of abortion workers. We should pray in church and elsewhere for the end of abortion but note that Ramona Trevino, a former Planned Parenthood manager and now the national 40 Days for Life Outreach Coordinator, said if vigil standers had not been outside her abortion clinic she would never have known people were praying for her!

Participating in 40 Days for Life is even more important now with Annapolis Planned Parenthood again conducting surgical abortions as well as distributing the abortion pills. Plans are also underway in the Maryland General Assembly to enshrine abortion in our state constitution. Such efforts along with the ongoing assisted suicide legalization efforts lead many to think because anti-life measures are legalized that they are also morally okay.
