APRIL SPEAKERS: MJ AND JERRY PARK FROM LITTLE FRIENDS FOR PEACE

Come hear the inspiring story that 2 people have made in bringing much needed peace to our communities. In 1981, MJ and Jerry Park founded Little Friends for Peace (LFFP). Named the "little" part we can all play in spreading peace. LFFP works tirelessly to eradicate violence by teaching skills for peace.

In 2006, LFFP officially became 501 (c) (3) tax exempt nonprofit and continues to operate through individual donor support.

LFFP run week-long Peace Camps throughout the summer and bring peace education to schools and after school programs for youth across DC-MD-VA area. LFFP also offers training, peace circles and enrichment programs for adults throughout the year.

In 2009, the Parks purchased the "Peace Oasis" in Accokeek, MD where visitors can experience peace with nature

We are privileged to have MJ and Jerry join our fraternity gathering on April 15th at Sacred Heart in Bowie. Plan on experiencing a peace circle and learn how St. Conrad's could partner with LFFP. All guests are welcome.

St. Conrad of Parzham -- Feast Day: April 21

On 4 October 1852, the Feast of Saint Francis, Brother Conrad had the happiness of making profession as a son of Saint Francis of Assisi. According to custom, the novice prepared for the momentous day by retreat. Perhaps we can find no better indication of the spirit in which he took the eventful step that bound him to a life of labor and sacrifice for God, than the resolutions that he penned during the days of the spiritual exercises. He headed the memo, "Resolutions taken with great deliberation and full confidence in the assistance of Jesus and Mary to help me to keep them." These are the resolutions:

- 1. **Presence of God:** "I will strive earnestly to form the habit of always placing myself in the presence of God and of often asking myself, 'Would I do this or that if my confessor or superior were observing me, and especially in the presence of God and my Angel Guardian."
- 2. **Bearing the Cross:** "I will often ask myself when crosses and pain come to me, 'Brother Conrad, why are you here?'"
- 3. **Protection of the Cloister:** "I will, as much as possible, avoid going out of the monastery, unless charity to my neighbor or obedience or health require it, or for some other good reason."
- 4. **Fraternal Charity:** "I will earnestly strive to cultivate brotherly love. I will patiently bear with the faults, defects, and weaknesses of others, and, as far as I can, I will throw the mantle of charity over them whenever I am obliged to report them to one who has the power to correct them."
- 5. **Silence:** "I will observe silence as much as possible. I will be sparing of words in conversation and so avoid many faults and may be able to converse better with God."
- 6. **Frugality:** "At table I will place myself in the presence of God. . . . I will deny myself dishes that I would relish particularly and will practice mortifications that are least noticeable. Outside of mealtime I will take no food unless commanded by holy obedience."
- 7. Punctuality: "If not otherwise prevented, I will go to the choir immediately when the signal is given."
- 8. **Chastity:** "As much as possible I will avoid association with persons of the other sex, unless obedience compels me."
- 9. **Obedience:** "I will practice obedience exactly and punctually and will endeavor to conquer my own will in all things."
- 10. **Fidelity to Rule:** "I will try to be faithful, even in small matters. I will never depart from the holy Rule, even by a hair's breadth."
- 11. **Devotion to the Mother of God:** "I will ever strive to cultivate a tender devotion to the Blessed Virgin and will endeavor to imitate her virtues."

This month at our fraternity gathering, we will begin a discussion of Jon Sweeney's book When Saint Francis Saved the Church by discussing Chapters 1 and 2. In Chapter 1, page 10, one of the objectives of the book is to explore Francis's spiritual vision and how it changed the church. He goes on to suggest that Pope Francis is changing the atmosphere in the Catholic Church today and he quotes a couple of lines from Pope Francis's homily that he spoke when addressing the cardinals who elected him. I thought you might like to read this entire homily which is provided on the next page.

In these three readings, I see a common element: that of movement. In the first reading, it is the movement of a journey; in the second reading, the movement of building the Church; in the third, in the Gospel, the movement involved in professing the faith. Journeying, building, professing.

(Is 2:5). This is the first thing that God said to Abraham: Walk in my presence and live blamelessly. **Journeying**: our life is a journey, and when we stop moving, things go wrong. Always journeying, in the presence of the Lord, in the light of the Lord, seeking to live with the blamelessness that God asked of Abraham in his promise.

Building. Building the Church. We speak of stones: stones are solid; but living stones, stones anointed by the Holy Spirit. Building the Church, the Bride of Christ, on the cornerstone that is the Lord himself. This is another kind of movement in our lives: building.

Thirdly, **professing**. We can walk as much as we want, we can build many things, but if we do not profess Jesus Christ, things go wrong. We may become a charitable NGO, but not the Church, the Bride of the Lord. When we are not walking, we stop moving. When we are not building on the stones, what happens? The same thing that happens to children on the beach when they build sandcastles: everything is swept away, there is no solidity. When we do not profess Jesus Christ, the saying of Léon Bloy comes to mind: "Anyone who does not pray to the Lord prays to the devil." When we do not profess Jesus Christ, we profess the worldliness of the devil, a demonic worldliness.

Journeying, building, professing. But things are not so straightforward, because in journeying, building, professing, there can sometimes be jolts, movements that are not properly part of the journey: movements that pull us back.

This Gospel continues with a situation of a particular kind. The same Peter who professed Jesus Christ, now says to him: You are the Christ, the Son of the living God. I will follow you, but let us not speak of the Cross. That has nothing to do with it. I will follow you on other terms, but without the Cross. When we journey without the Cross, when we build without the Cross, when we profess Christ without the Cross, we are not disciples of the Lord, we are worldly: we may be bishops, priests, cardinals, popes, but not disciples of the Lord.

My wish is that all of us, after these days of grace, will have the courage, yes, the courage, to walk in the presence of the Lord, with the Lord's Cross; to build the Church on the Lord's blood which was poured out on the Cross; and to profess the one glory: Christ crucified. And in this way, the Church will go forward.

My prayer for all of us is that the Holy Spirit, through the intercession of the Blessed Mary, our Mother, will grant us this grace: to walk, to build, to profess Jesus Christ Christ crucified. Amen
