Minister's Minute:

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Monday August 14th is the Feast of St. Maximilian Kolbe and is being celebrated with a Tridium of Masses at St. Anthony's Shrine in Ellicott City. He founded the Militia Immaculata, is known for laying down his life for a fellow prisoner

at Auschwitz, and for his devotion to the Blessed Mother. The following is a Kolbean Prayer to Mary, Mother of the Church:

Mary, Mother of the Church, I come before you in the spirit of St. Maximilian Kolbe, who consecrated his Franciscan life and work to you without reserve. You accepted Maximilian's self-offering; accept me. You led Maximilian to Christ, lead me. You formed Maximilian into a mirror of Christ, form me. Your union with Maximilian provided a backdrop for his works of evangelization and heroic acts of charity. Please grant through the intercession of St. Maximilian, that I might fully collaborate with you and the Holy Spirit as an instrument for the upbuilding of Christ's Church. Amen.

Little Portion Farm is a ministry of the Franciscan Friars Conventual in Ellicott City focused on providing fresh food to those in need while using sustainable farming methods to restore the health of our land. The 3-acre farm functions as an "agro-ecosystem," with a diversity of plants and habitats to support the life of this "little portion" of creation. As the food harvested from the farm is donated to the Franciscan Center in Baltimore, the overarching mission of this ministry is, using the words of Pope Francis, to "hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor."

In addition to common annual vegetable crops, sections of the farm are dedicated to native flowering plants, in an effort to provide habitat for pollinators and other beneficial insects to reduce pest pressures. The farm also includes a perennial section where we have planted asparagus, strawberries, Jerusalem artichokes, and also berry canes/bushes and fruit trees. Our goal is not only to diversify the farm ecosystem, but also to be able to provide a wide range of healthy fruits and vegetables to those in need.


The farm is also meant to serve as a place of gathering, service, reflection, and education for the local community, cultivating a deeper appreciation of the beauty of the natural world and its interconnectedness, and realizing the Catholic call to serve the most vulnerable and protect creation. 
Volunteers

THE ODDITIES OF CREATION – Joan Faltot

There are more things in heaven and earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy – Hamlet

The quote from Hamlet often comes to my mind when I learn of some of the amazing things that are being discovered in God's creation.

I remember the Deepwater Horizon oil rig that exploded and sank April 2010 resulting in the leaking of four million barrels of oil over an 87-day period. Soon after that I learned that there are bacteria that eat oil. In fact, marine bacteria in several families, including Marinobacter, Oceanospiralles, Pseudomonas, and Alkanivorax, can eat compounds from petroleum as part of their diet and there are at least seven species of bacteria that can survive solely on oil.

So, this past week, I learned some amazing things about worms. Though if I dreamt of these, it would be a nightmare. From two different sources via email, I learned about invasive worms that can upset the large areas of the US including our area. Both of these types of worms accidentally hitched a ride from Asia. By the way, our friendly earthworm was not indigenous to America but crossed over from Europe.)

First up, meet the Bipalium or by its nickname, the **hammerhead worm**. It has been spreading through the U.S. since at least the early 1900s and this past month it has been spotted in Maryland. It's pretty. It has probably been moving up from the southern states... very slowly. It can grow over a foot long. They are slightly poisonous if touched with bare hands. They secrete a neurotoxin called tetrodotoxin, which is the same poison in pufferfish. If you happen to touch one of these worms, you will probably only get a tingle or a numb feeling

for a short time. They need moisture to survive so they would be found under rocks and logs and decaying leaves. They eat earthworms, slugs, and snails by paralyzing their prey with the neurotoxin which is secreted from their skin. Fortunately, they don't eat plants are their impact on our ecosystem is limited. I you see one, do not try and kill it by cutting it in half—you will be left with 2 hammerheads. You can pour table salt on them and scoop them up with a shovel and put them out with household trash. They also reproduce via eggs.





Next up, the Asian Jumping Worm. It looks like an earthworm except it is grayer in color and the band is white or light color and goes all around it's body and is flush with its body. The European nightcrawler' band reddish-brown, is raised above its body and does not wrap around its entire body.

The Asian Jumping worm only grow to 6 inches. Observations of them date back to the late 19th century. They are an "annual" species since they die with the first freeze; however, their eggs live on and hatch in the spring. They are

much more aggressive than our European nightcrawler, they grow twice as fast, reproduce more quickly and are able to infest soils at high densities. They are a concern to our ecosystem. These worms devour organic matter more rapidly than other earthworms and can strip the forest of the layer humus critical for seedlings and can severely damage the roots of plants in gardens, turf, and forests. Eliminating them is complex. Final fact: the move like a snake and very fast and may appear to be jumping.
