# **APOSTLESHIP OF THE SEA CHRISTMAS SHOE BOX**

In December, our fraternity has traditionally put together gift boxes for merchant seafarers who visit the Port of Baltimore. We did this because the seafarers put out to sea for long periods of time and are away from friends and family during this festive season.

There are 3 ways to help:

- If you wish to fill a <u>plastic</u> shoe box, you can bring it to the Fraternity meeting on December 16. Please remember that there are also women Seafarers as well!! New guidelines require we fill a <u>plastic</u> shoe box which makes sense since a cardboard shoe box is no match for the rodents in the port area who can stiff out the beef jerky in the box. Stuff the <u>plastic</u> shoebox full of some of the items below, and wrap it with festive paper. See the list of suggested items below.
- You could send a check to the Apostleship of the Sea at 320 Cathedral Street; Baltimore, MD 21202.
- 3) You can order items in bulk (like socks, warm hats, or gloves) and bring them to the Dec. 16<sup>th</sup> fraternity meeting. We'll deliver them to Dundalk with the gift boxes. Or if you order bulk items online, e.g. Amazon, you can have them shipped directly to Apostleship of the Sea, 6 Dunmanway, Dundalk, MD 21222.

#### Suggested contents:

Toothbrushes, toothpaste, dental floss, combs, nail clippers, mouthwash, shampoos, comb/brush, hand sanitizer, lip balm Hair conditioners, soap, shaving cream, deodorant, Q-tips, disposable razors

Socks, gloves, scarves, knit "watch caps" that cover the head and ears

Ball caps, pens, pencils, writing supplies, English dictionaries, 2024 calendars, pocket-sized address books/ planners

Scotch tape, playing cards, travel sized games, reading materials (magazines, paperbacks)

Non-perishable foods/snacks/candy (no chocolate--it melts!) and a small Christmas card or blessing signed from a member, or members, of the Fraternity.

# SERVING THE POOR WITH SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL from Dave Weir, ofs

In September, 2022, I went to Mass at St. Bernadette's Church on Stevenson Road and learned about the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Several members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul gave a presentation after Mass. After explaining what they do, one of the members concluded by saying "We need help". They asked that anyone who might be interested meet with the members in the back of the church after Mass. After hearing the member ask for help, I felt prompted to go to the back of the church and speak with them. I was invited to attend the next meeting, which took place the following Thursday evening at the Christ the King Pastoral Center, 126 Dorsey Road, Glen Burnie.

I found the members of the St. Josephine Bakhita conference, St. Vincent de Paul Society, to be very caring, spiritual people who are very sincere and strongly dedicated to helping the poor. They answer the calls that come into the Pastoral Center requesting financial support to avoid eviction, electricity or water shut off, and food deliveries. Sometimes a conference call is made to the neighbor by two members, but most of the time two members go to the home of the neighbor for a visit. If the neighbor needs food, the members bring food to the neighbor. During the visit, the members pray with the neighbor, review the neighbor's financial situation, provide information about various types of assistance that are available, and make suggestions on ways to handle the current crisis so that hopefully the neighbor will not find himself or herself in the same situation in the

future. The members then make a recommendation to the group as to whether financial assistance should be offered to the neighbor. The recommendation is almost always a positive one.

For approximately one year, I have been answering all of the calls that are received at the Christ the King Pastoral Center on Wednesdays. I usually answer between five and ten calls and then log those calls into the ServWare database. I have been on numerous home visits and almost always find the neighbors to be very welcoming and appreciative that we are there to visit them. Sometimes it is assumed that people requesting financial and other assistance are in the situation in which they find themselves because they don't work. I have found that this is not usually the case. I have found that the majority of the cases involve people who work hard, but don't make enough money to be able to have savings to cover a period of unemployment caused by injury, illness, reduction in hours, or loss of employment. They need a helping hand to recover from an unfortunate situation and help them get back on their feet financially. The last fiscal year, 898 telephone calls were received, 338 households were helped, and 655 bags of groceries were distributed.

Since September of 2022, there have been three occasions that we had to stop making home visits and conference calls to neighbors requesting assistance. The down time only lasted a few weeks or so. We depend solely on donations to financially assist neighbors in trouble. #### A Franciscan Reflects on Celano's Greccio 1223 Christmas Anonymous Franciscan



After reading Celano's account of St. Francis' vision for a replica of Christ's birthplace (His nursery & first home) for midnight Mass at Greccio, Italy in 1223, I had several questions. Why was the scene so bare? Where were the people, especially Mary & St. Joseph?

A gentle voice spoke to my heart, "It contains only the most important elements.

The Stable/Animal Shelter is You/your heart; it is where Jesus wants to be born. I know you are far from perfect and will provide minimum shelter from the world outside but My original home was in a similar state. The openness of the animal shelter was important – it provided easy access between Me and the world – I wanted nothing to keep us apart.

The Ox represents the everyday mundane burdens/chores of your life that you carry in your heart.

**The Donkey**, because he carried Mary & Baby Jesus from Nazareth to Bethlehem & from there to Egypt, represents the spiritual/religious portion of your life carried in your heart. I want so much to be a part of your whole life – not just the spiritual/religious.

**The Straw/The Hay, My original bed**, provided food & bedding for the animals & stuffed mattresses and had other uses for the townsfolk. The bed is empty because I await your invitation to enter. My great desire/My goal was, and still is, to provide for all the needs of My people – the mundane, everyday "stuff" as well as the spiritual/religious portions of your life, and for the needs of all of creation."

Will you invite Me in? – I can't enter without being invited.

Will you ask Me to stay with you every day for the rest of your life? - for this I long.

Will you bring Me to others that I may provide for their needs, too?
