CONTEMPLATION CORNER -- From Joan Faltot

I have difficulty reading sometimes. Other times, an author's sentence structure is so concise the metaphoric that is the written work reads like poetry. Such was the following except expressing the need to forgive. It is from a letter by Saint Francis of Paola (1416-1507). It appears as part of the Office of Readings, Second Reading for April 2^{nd} .

Pardon one another so that later on you will not remember the injury. The recollection of an injury is itself wrong. It adds to our anger, nurtures our sin and hates what is good. It is a rusty arrow and poison for the soul. It puts all virtue to flight. It is like a worm in the mind: it confuses our speech and tears to shreds our petitions to God. It is foreign to charity: it remains planted in the soul like a nail. It is wickedness that never sleeps, sin that never fails. It is indeed a daily death.

REDUCE ... REUSE ... RECYCLE (AND AVOID PLASTIC): THE MILLERSVILLE LANDFILL AND BEYOND

The Millersville Landfill & Resource Recovery Facility is the only active municipal solid waste landfill owned by Anne Arundel County. It opened in September 1975 and is located on more than 565 acres in Severn. Within a landfill are individual waste-holding "cells" which are large excavated basins lined with an impermeable barrier.

At Millersville, 8 disposals cells have been filled. Garbage is currently being dumped in cell 9—the LAST cell currently permitted for waste disposal. It actually has subcells. Subcell 9.1 went into use in January 2017. Subcell 9.2 went into use March 2022. Future subcell construction activities will be completed on an "as needed" basis. It is estimated that subcell construction activities will take place every 5 -7 years, depending upon the incoming waste volumes.

At this point, the county is trying to extend the life of the Millersville landfill as long as possible. Recycling rate has increased to 37%. The county is also <u>diverting waste</u> to other facilities such that today, the majority of residential waste is disposed of outside the county. Following this strategy, the county hopes that cell 9, the final cell, will not be filled until 2048.

For years, America sold millions of tons of used yogurt cups, juice containers, shampoo bottles and other kinds of plastic trash to China to be recycled into new products. All together 70% of the world's plastic was sent to China. However, in 2017 the Chinese government cut way back on plastic trash imports and only took in 1% of its 2016 total. Now trash is going to Thailand, Malaysia, Vietnam, Indonesia. Recycling plants in many of these areas can't handle the volume, so it may be dumped in the countryside or burned. Vietnam and Malaysia now limiting in imports. In the US, some areas have resorted to storing it in trailers.


It's easy to understand why there are large islands of plastic floating in the oceans. These islands consist primarily of suspended microplastics ("fingernail-sized or smaller"—often microscopic—particles).

I'll cut this horror story short but just mention that you can't escape micro- & nano-sized plastic. Plastic breaks up but doesn't disappear. It is in marine life, the soil used for growing crops, our drinking water, the food we eat, and inside our bodies and blood. My take on this problem: wherever possible buy items in glass or paper and avoid plastic.

And kudos for the Millersville landfill. In the upper recycling area, there is a dedicated container for clean glass and another for clean cardboard (no food waste). This results very efficient recycling for materials that are far more recyclable than plastic.

Housing Options:

Housing options will include single and double hotel-like rooms with private baths in the, **Christiane Inn** in close proximity to the dining room and meeting rooms. Accommodations are also available in cottages, downhill from the dining and meeting space. **Cottages** have two twin beds per room and shared baths down the hall. Map and more explanation of housing can be found on the regional website.

Event Costs:

All meals (Friday dinner through Sunday breakfast) and registration fees are included in the cost of the rooms. The lodging cost is based on the type of housing selected from the options below. There are no additional fees.

- Inn single room/1 queen bed for 1 person (\$265 by April 30/\$315 after May 1)
- Inn 2nd person in single room/1 queen bed for 2 persons (\$208 per person by April 30/\$235 per person after May 1) must designate roommate
- Inn double room/2 queen beds for 2 persons (\$225 per person by April 30/\$275 per person after May 1) roommate may be designated or assigned (\$200 per person by April 30/\$230 per person
- after May 1) must designate roommates
- \bullet Inn double room/2 queen beds for four persons (\$188 per person by April 30/\$210 per person after

May 1) – must designate roommates Cottage – two twin beds per room for 2 persons (\$185 per person by April 30/\$235 per person after May 1) – roommate may be designated or assigned (no single rooms in cottages)

PLEASE NOTE: Single rooms are limited and available on a 1st come, 1st served basis. If you want a single room, or to reserve any other room of your choice, we encourage you to register and pay the \$150 deposit ASAP.

<u>Payment Options</u>: Payment can be made via check or credit card (subject to 3.5% fee).
