Stay with me Jesus, I do not ask for divine consolation because I do not merit it, but the gift of Your presence, oh yes, I ask this of You.

Stay with me Lord, for it is You alone I look for, Your Love, Your Grace, Your Will, Your Heart, Your Spirit, because I love You and ask no other reward but to love You more and more.

With a firm love, I will love You with all my heart while on earth and continue to love You perfectly during all eternity. Amen.

BLESSED SOLANUS CASEY, NOVEMBER 25, 1870 – JULY 31, 1957

We probably remember the great excitement around the Beatification of Venerable (July 11, 1995), Fr. Solanus Casey, OFM, Cap, in Detroit, Michigan on November 11, 2017. He lived and served most of his decades as a priest at St Bonaventures in Detroit.

However, I am getting ahead of myself. He was born into a very devout Catholic family, his parents were Secular Franciscans, it is very possible that Bl. Was as well. They were a very devout, simple, poor, hardworking, supportive family with FOURTEEN children. Two of his brothers were also priests of different denominations. These three brothers were very close. Bl. Solanus was also noted to have all of these family traits within himself, especially daily reception of Communion;

“Frequent Communion brings peace into a family and into the soul. It also fosters faith in God and heavenly relationships with all God’s dear ones in heaven”.

Daily Communion was such a driving force in his life. He was discerning to which order to apply. His call to the priesthood came from Mary following a novena to seek Our Lady's help. It was December 8, she said "Go to Detroit", which he knew meant the Capuchins. His grades stumbled in the seminary and he was considered academically not fit to be ordained. By the way, instruction was only in German. He did receive the Franciscan Habit as well as the tonsure. He was ordained a priest on July 24, 1904 as a 'simplex priest', one who may not hear confessions or preach doctrinal sermons. His simplicity was quickly recognized in his service for soup kitchens, non-Catholics, people of other races, the imprisoned, the poor, children and all who came to him. He delighted in serving as a sacristan where he was always close to our Lord. His humility is amazing from his two habits which he mended to mixing up the food on his plate into one and eating it as a penance for all that he received.

"If our love of God were really genuine, we would quite naturally love our neighbors as ourselves"

So, what about the porter job? Bl. Solanus served at other Capuchin parishes where he did open the door and had conversations with those who came seeking advice, before returning to Detroit. He would council the people to enroll in the Seraphic Mass Association (SMA) with a small donation which supported foreign missions under the care of the Capuchins, as well as to do something for the Lord. Bl. Solanus became so busy talking to people that a helper porter put a sign on the door in Detroit: Walk In. Bl. Solanus would bless the person and answer their prayer often with complete healing and bring them closer to God and the Catholic faith. There are many more of these healings.

When the epidemic of Polio struck many were cured, following a blessing and encouragement to do something for the Lord. some even before the person requesting healing returned home.

Six women came to Bl. Solanus who wanted to enter a religious novitiate. The superior decided that they needed to be a group of 12. Soon after more applied as postulants, and before the end of the year, 12 novices were invested.

Bl. Solanus could also comfort and always told what he knew to be truth. A wife came to see him and asked for prayers for her hospitalized husband. Bl. Solanus called the man's room and offered prayers of comfort. He then told the man "Now John I will be praying for you this evening. I am going to pray for a happy death". The following day the man died a happy, peaceful death, and his wife and family found peace, also. He was very prophetic.

"If you can honestly humble yourself, your victory will be certain"

An important step in the Cause for Canonization is the exhumation canonical of his body. After 30 years of burial his body was found to be 95% intact. Clothed in a new habit, his body is interred in a cement crypt beneath the floor, covered by glass. At St. Bonaventure's Church. Pilgrims have been coming ever since.

The quotes are from Bl. Solanus. I read two books about Bl. Solanus: 'Meet Solanus Casey' by Bro. Leo Wollenweber, OFM, Cap. This is a shorter, easier read. Another published by the Father Solanus Guild in 1968, it is titled 'The Porter of St. Bonaventure's', and written by James Derum. This book contains first-hand accounts of blessings by Bl. Solanus as well as more details.



The Catholic Climate Covenant has compiled resources and materials from their valued partners and friends to assist you, your family, and
