Minister's Minute: Dear brothers and sisters in the LORD,

January is a month of looking forward and looking back. I ask you to do that in preparation for the council meeting on Saturday, February 3, at Capuchin College to plan our year of programs and continuing formation. Looking back and forward is appropriate, as long as you don't let one or both overcome the present. It is not the way to live life or the Rule. These should be lived in the present—the only moment we have to "Make Christ the inspiration and center of our lives with God and people." See Rule 4.

Have you had a chance to consider, as I suggested in the last issue, making a resolution to Live our Rule of Life—which means to live the Gospel by loving God and neighbor, by being Christ for others, by looking for and finding Christ in others, by building relationships? Have you had a chance to read the Rule and the Rite of Profession, the 17 Essential Elements of Secular Franciscan Spirituality folder, and the Vision questionnaire? I hope you'll have some time this week before the meeting. If not, however, we will provide time at the meeting to complete the questionnaire. We take seriously your comments and opinions. Also, at our meeting Saturday, we will have time to consider a few of the Rules in small-table discussions. Perhaps that exercise will begin to motivate us to take more seriously our resolution to live the Rule. As St. Francis said, "Let us begin again, for so far we have done little."

For nearly a half century, the Catholic Church in the United States has celebrated National Migration Week, which is an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting migrants, including immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking. The theme for National Migration Week 2017, "Many Journeys, One Family," draws attention to the fact that each of our families have a migration story, some recent and others in the distant past. Regardless of where we are and where we came from, we remain part of the human family and are called to live in solidarity with one another.

Unfortunately, in our contemporary culture we often fail to encounter migrants as persons, and instead look at them as unknown others, if we even notice them at all. We do not take the time to engage migrants in a meaningful way, as fellow children of God, but remain aloof to their presence and suspicious or fearful of them. During this National Migration Week, let us all take the opportunity to engage migrants as community members, neighbors, and friends.

CARE FOR CREATION

REDUCE-REUSE-RECYCLE by Susan Burns, OFS

Did you watch the MPT program Sultan and the Saint? Years ago I participated in a book study on The Saint and the Sultan by Paul Moses. I just looked for it to share with you, but I must have given it to someone else as I can't find it. Anyway, Paul Moses was one of the contributors as were a number of Franciscans, but there were also numerous Muslim contributors to the program including professors in Islamic studies. It was very good. Gave me a lot to think about.

I sometimes get so frustrated with friends, family, parish, and SFO fraternity and their lack of enthusiasm about caring for creation. This movie, in thinking about Saint Francis and his response of love, helped me to reflect more on developing that relationship with God first, loving all where they are and being less judgmental, and being more patient and persistent in proclaiming the Gospel message to Care for all God has created.

So now I am asking everyone to contribute to the sustainability of the environment God has placed in our care. There are a few things we can do right now in our fraternity that could readily play forward to our homes and families and to others. Pope Francis tells us in Laudato Si, paragraph #21, "The earth, our home, is beginning more and more to look like an immense pile of filth." By having a 3Rs mentality, REDUCE-REUSE-RECYCLE, we can, as a

community, make an impact.

Let's first look at our trash management, look into the trash barrel at our meetings. What can we do? We can simplify. We can reduce the amount of paper generated by providing hard paper copies only for those who cannot communicate electronically. Each secular can create their own notes of presentations instead of depending on handouts, besides God may be sending me a very different message from the one He is sending you in the same presentation.

Over the years our breakfast snack has grown to a hearty breakfast. Shouldn't our meals be simplified? Or maybe we should each bring our own snack or not have food or something in between? When there is food trash after our meetings, we could have a container for the food trash that can be taken to a compost, i.e. raw fruit and vegetables, eggshells, tea bags, coffee grounds, Deans Beans coffee bags (minus the plastic button insert). Is there a compost at St. John's? Do you have one at home and at your parish?

We seem to be doing pretty well at utilizing reusable mugs for coffee/tea. What do you think about bringing your own plate and utensils as well? How about using cloth napkins and tea towels instead of paper napkins and paper towels? After reducing and reusing, there still is trash, but we could try to make as much as possible of the leftovers in the trash be recyclable trash. Make sure we only use biodegradable paper products. If it's biodegradable, it will say so on the packaging and/or on the bottom side of the product. Empty your cups of liquid down the drain and remove leftover food from your plate into the trash or compost container before putting biodegradable paper products in the recycle. NEVER use Styrofoam or those plates that look like hard plastic. They may cost the least monetarily, but cost the most to the earth. Styrofoam

never decomposes. It often breaks into smaller pieces that create an eyesore along our roads and waterways and are ingested by animals causing harm, disease, and even death.

Care for all God has created. Recyclable items should be loose in the recycle container as items in plastic bags are discarded at recycle facilities as trash. Plastic bags should be collected and returned to the grocery store and not placed in the trash. Paper towels and napkins are not recyclable and should remain in the trash. What are your ideas?

With the season of advent setting in, the festive of Christmas begins to fill the air and I take this opportunity to wish you all a merry Christmas and a grace filled New Year. It is indeed very appropriate to remember you and wish you all the poor people of this Christmas season. Your care and concern for the poor people of this diocese is really an act of mercy. I know that it is from your limited source of income that you are helping our poor people through Franciscan Family Apostolate.

I am happy to say that many beneficiary families here make the best use of the help they get from you. In some families the children get chance to study for professional course like medicine, engineering, post graduation in different subjects, and also in different types of vocational training and thus they could find suitable jobs to sustain their families. Some families get involved in self venture like garment sale, running petty shops, goat rearing, coir spinning, fish vending and some fishermen even have their own fishing crafts with the help of micro credit loan from FFA. In some cases the sponsors were extra ordinarily generous in supporting the families in settling girls in marriage, building strong houses with partial help from the government too. Sr. Helen and the staff, I must say, are doing their level best to help the poor people by making arrangements for reaching out the poor in their need.


Let me tell you the plans for Father Roshan Anthonypillai and Father Reynaldo Frias who were ordained on December 9th.

BR. KEON TU, BR. DIOGO ESCUDERO AND BR. SAUL SORIANO TAKING PERPETUAL VOWS


